
# The Internet Society

**Educational events** – educating members and the public about Internet-related issues.


**Community programs** – ensuring Internet access for economically disadvantaged people or those with disabilities.

#### 20 June 1991

At the first INET conference Vint Cerf announced the Internet Society's founding, based on a document signed by Vint Cerf, Bob Kahn, and Lyman Chapin. Cerf also announced that the INET Conferences would henceforth be conducted under Internet Society auspices and become the forum for the Internet Society's annual meetings.

#### 1 October 1991

Jon Postel manages to beat out Stephen Wolff in a race to write the first \$70 check for the Internet Society membership dues, receiving member number 1314159 (one, followed by the first six digits of  $\pi$ ) and becoming the Internet Society's first individual member.
